Winter Storms Batter Maine, Create Challenges for EHS Professionals!

The trio of wind-driven storms that rolled through Maine in late December/early January created a challenging scenario for EHS professionals. Anyone who was responsible for the safety of employees during these storms found themselves glued to the weather reports while they tried to anticipate where the most problems would surface.

Companies that make their living delivering goods and services on the highways found treacherous conditions and passage impossible. Wet, icy, snowy weather and washed-out bridges and roads made driving hazardous at best. Add in fallen trees and downed power poles and the situation was dire.

Companies that operate out of traditional brick-and-mortar facilities, if they were lucky enough to still have power and Internet, found other hazards affecting their employees. Slick, icy conditions in parking lots, sidewalks, and dock doors made walking tricky. High winds blowing debris around the property, knocking over trees, stripping shingles from roofs, and turning them into projectiles made moving around a gamble.

Waterfront businesses had even more of a challenge – flooded streets and parking lots were impassable. The flooding extended into the buildings themselves and in some cases, the buildings themselves were swept away.

All of these storm-related dangers put the EHS professional on edge and test their skill at keeping their charges out of harm's way.
